National Coordinator Visits Family Place at the Diamond Bar Library

The Diamond Bar Library was recently visited by Kathleen Deerr, National Coordinator for Family Place Libraries.

During her visit, Ms. Deerr toured the facility, met with staff and representatives from the Friends of the Library, and presented the library with a banner proclaiming it as a Family Place Library. Ms. Deerr spoke eloquently about the vital importance of parents and their key role in children's development during the baby and toddler years, and of the many ways that Family Place Libraries support early learning and literacy.

Family Place is a nationwide initiative to provide a welcoming environment for families with young children by creating an appropriate space, locating resources for parents and caregivers, and holding special programs. A signature program of Family Place is the Parent Child Workshop, which is held twice yearly at the Diamond Bar Library. These workshops are specially designed for toddlers and their parents or caregivers. Parents are able to meet and make connections with local professionals who serve as resources in areas like child development, speech therapy, and pediatric dentistry. The role of parents as the first teachers of their children is emphasized and the workshops help them gain strategies for healthy child development and early literacy.

Family Place Libraries also feature carefully planned spaces that are comfortable for families with small children. These spaces always include lots of toys, which are the tools of learning for pre-literate children, music, multimedia materials, and books for babies and toddlers, as well as parenting resources for adults.

Support from the Diamond Bar Friends of the Library has been crucial to the library becoming a Family Place site. Funds from the Friends have been used to transform the Children's Area into a Family Place by adding developmentally-appropriate toys, a special parenting collection including books and multimedia materials, and comfortable seating for children and their parents. Children's Librarian Julie McCasland has also received training in an intensive three-day workshop held at the flagship Family Place in the Middle Country Public Library in Long Island, New York. The Diamond Bar Library continues to embrace its role as a Family Place and as an essential resource for supporting families and emergent literacy in the Diamond Bar Community.

This is a recent email (s) from IVRSE Director Marsha Hawkins attending the National Scripps Spelling Bee where we had a contestant from the Inland Valley Spelling Bee:

During the question and answer session at the end of the Scripps Spelling Bee, the new reigning Champion, Sukanya Roy, from Abington Township in Pennsylvania, was asked, "Did you have trouble with any of the words you were given during the bee?" Her answer: "The words were really hard, but all the words I got I just knew." !!!!!!!!!!!

Do you remember those words? We're talking about words like "psephomancy, pyopoiesis, volkerwanderung, zwischenspiel, periscii," and of course, her championship word, "cymotrichous"!!!! Honestly, if you were watching and you heard these words pronounced, you probably felt like me and thought you wouldn't even know how to GUESS what letter of the alphabet the words began with.

At first I felt sorry for her because I thought maybe they had it in for her. From the Librarian's Desk



By the time you read this, the Diamond Bar Library will just be finishing up another successful summer of reading for the whole family. Our Children's Summer Reading Program had more than 525 kids enrolled by the end of July. Children celebrated this year's theme, *One World, Many Stories*, by stopping by the library to do art activities from around the world, including Grecian urns, Egyptian cartouches, and Japanese raku birdfeeders. Special performances included balloon twisters, magicians, musicians, and belly dancers. Summer reading is not just for kids, however, and teens and adults were able to win chances for incentives and prizes for each book that they read this summer. By the end of July, there were more than 400 teen books and more than 300 adult books read by participants.

This year the Diamond Bar Library was also proud to be picked as one of ten libraries County-wide that were selected to have a special, second Summer Reading Program for kids, the Bow Wow Reading Club. For each participating child that reached a reading goal of sixteen hours a stray dog was groomed for adoption in his or her name. Since groomed dogs are far more likely to be taken home from shelters, the children of Diamond Bar were able to save animals as they made their reading goals! This program was sponsored by the Los Angeles County Library Foundation and the Los Angeles County Animal Care Foundation, and we at the Diamond Bar Library were glad to participate in an endeavor that benefitted both children and dogs.

Though summer is not yet over, we are already looking forward to autumn and the back-to-school season here at the Diamond Bar Library. Teens will be happy to see a refreshed Teen Space in the library, which now offers funky and fun lounge chairs as well as café-style seating perfect for after-school small group studying. Readers of all ages can look forward to the upcoming Read Together, Diamond Bar and our annual partnership with the Pomona Big Read. This year's selection, *The Maltese Falcon* by Dashiell Hammett, will be celebrated with book discussions and interesting and informative programs for people of all ages. Each year the County Library Foundation offers Friends groups an opportunity to apply for these grants, which are designed to stimulate creative and innovative special projects. All of us at the Diamond Bar Library would like to thank both the Friends and the Library Foundation for funding this exciting project, which will greatly benefit the hundreds of teens that use the library each week.
